SLVUSD District Expectations Regarding Bring Your Own Device Program

What:

- Devices should have at least an 8 hour battery life, wireless, and a real, non-screen, keyboard. Chromebooks are recommended
- A cell phone is not considered to be an adequate device for school purposes
- Cell Phones are blocked from school Wi-Fi during school hours
- Please label the device with the student’s first and last name

When:

- Bring your device to school every day
- Loaner devices will also be available to check out from school **FOR THE YEAR**
- Families are responsible for the return of Loaner Devices at the end of the school year
- Devices need to be fully charged at home each night so they will last the school day
- Devices will be used in classrooms when instructed by staff to do so
- Devices will be put away, either turned off or in a sleep mode, when instructed by staff to do so

How:

- During SCHOOL HOURS, students must use their school-issued email account: (ex: 19adaly@slvUSD.org. Create your own password and REMEMBER IT!)
- During class, devices will only be used for school-related activities as instructed by the teacher.
- Outside of class, students must follow all rules of Acceptable Use Policy and School Discipline Policy when using their device.
- Students should not touch or use another student’s device without permission from the owner.
- Vandalism, misuse, or theft of another student’s device will follow School Discipline Policy and may be reported to law enforcement.

Safety:

- It is recommended to have protection for your device. This could include a sleeve, a hard shell case, a backpack with a padded sleeve, or all of these together, to provide as much protection as possible. Some companies are now making “School Chromebooks” which come with harder shell and are more shock resistant.

- Never put a pencil or other object on a laptop as closing the lid will damage the screen.
- It is recommended that a student never leave his or her device unattended at school.
- The care and safety of the device is the responsibility of the student. The school and the district are not responsible for lost, damaged, or stolen devices.
- During Physical Education classes, student must lock their devices, along with their other valuables, in their P.E. lockers.
- Food and Drink are not allowed anywhere near any device at any time ever.

- Students must pass and complete Math 1 or its equivalent in order to earn a high school diploma - contact your academic counselor for specific information.
- Students must pass the Senior Exit Portfolio prior to graduation.

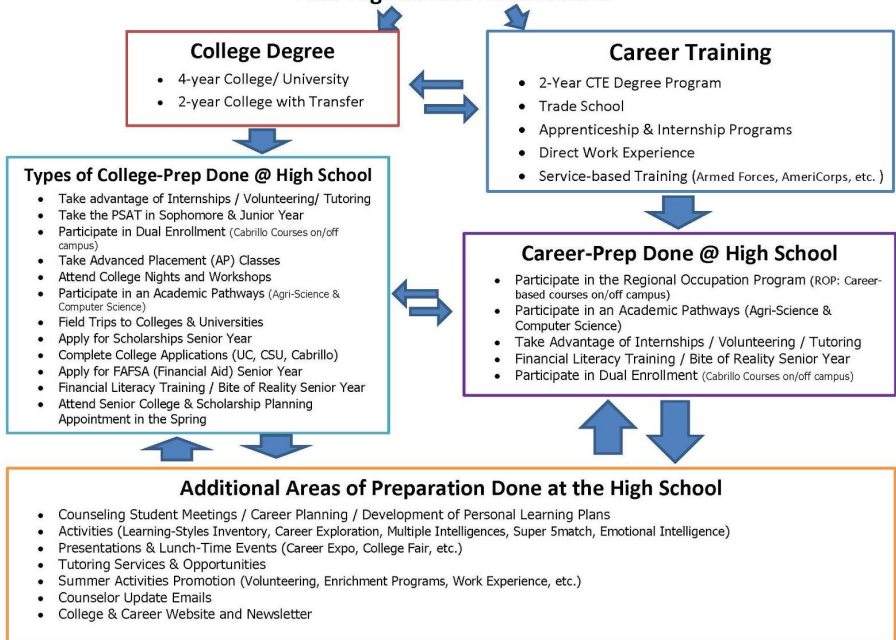
- Eligibility for participation in extra-curricular activities requires a 2.0 GPA and no Fs. Grades will be reviewed each grading period.
- Report cards and transcripts will be held for any fees owed to San Lorenzo Valley High School or any other high school in California. Fees/Fines may only be cleared through the person to whom the fee/fine is due. The Registrar can only remove the fee from the computer and issue a report card upon the student/parent presenting written proof of payment.
- Changing classes: We do not accept requests for teacher changes. AP courses cannot be changed without a petition to administration.
- Attendance/behavior infractions that result in time owed must be cleared or the hours will follow the student into the next school year. Seniors need to have time completed in order to attend senior events and activities.

COMMUNICATION

Schoology

Schoology is our online grade book for students and parents. All teachers use Schoology to post their syllabus, homework, class assignments, and grades. Teachers also use this platform for students to post online discussions on class topics as well as take online quizzes and tests. Students, parents and guardians will be assigned a username and password to access student information. Check with the Office for assistance at 335-4425.

PowerSchool

PowerSchool is our online student information system. Parents can check attendance, historical grades or final term grades on Powerschool. Powerschool grades only update when a grading period ends and the grade is final. Students, parents and guardians will be assigned a username and password to access student information. Check with the Office for assistance at 335-4425.

Cougar Newsletter

Each Friday, the Cougar Newsletter is emailed out to all parents/guardians and students. Please make sure that we have your correct email address. Please contact Rachel Ogilvie at rogilvie@slvusd.org to make sure you're on our email list. This is the way for parents and students to stay on top of key happenings at SLVHS.

Student Bulletin

The student bulletin is read at the beginning of school each day. It is each student's responsibility to know about the announcements in the bulletin. A copy of the bulletin can be found on our web page hs.slvusd.org under Daily Bulletin.

School Messenger All Call

Administration will use the all call phone or email feature when we need to get important information to the entire school, various grade levels or groups. This is also used for school wide emergency information and school closures.

Progress Reports/Report Cards

Progress reports are mailed home at the progress four times each year. Report cards are mailed home at the end of each semester. See Important Dates to Remember.

Address, Phone and Email Change

In order for the school to keep parents/guardians informed and to insure that contact can be made quickly if necessary, it is imperative that the Attendance Office be informed of any change of address, email or phone number (home, work, cell) as well as emergency contact information. Report cards are mailed to student homes.

ATTENDANCE

Class attendance is an essential part of the educational process at San Lorenzo Valley High School. A student who is absent from class misses a significant portion of academic discussion and personal interaction with other students and the teacher. Illnesses are unavoidable, but appointments, vacations and day trips during school should be avoided.

California Education Code recognizes only the following reasons as excused absences: personal illness; religious holidays; medical or dental services; serious family emergencies; and/or school suspension. All other absences will be recorded as unexcused.

Clearing Absences: There are two methods for clearing absences:

1. Call the Attendance Line and Leave a Message

Please call the attendance line, **preferably the day that your student is absent**, at 335-3646. This phone line is available 24/7. Please leave the following information when you call:

- 1) *First and last name of the student*
- 2) *The specific reason for the absence*
- 3) *Date and period of the absence(s)*
- 4) *Phone number where the parent can be reached*

If the absence is called in, and logged in PowerSchool, the students will not need to get a re-admit slip to attend classes upon return.

2. Send Your Student Back to School with a Note

Alternately, you can send your student back to school the day they return with a note that includes all information listed above.

- Before school starts, the student takes the note to the attendance office where a Re-Admit Slip will be issued. This Re-Admit Slip allows the student back into class that day.
- The student must keep the Re-Admit Slip in a safe place and show it to each of their teachers throughout the day. This lets the teachers know the student's absence has been excused.
- Zero Period classes will have to come up to the office during the day with their note and show the re-admit to the teacher the next day since the office is not open before zero period starts.
- Failure to clear absences will result in consequences including detention, loss of privileges (dances, sports contests) and possible in-school suspension.
- If the student does not get the re-admit before school starts, and is sent up to the office to get one, the student will be considered tardy.

Excessive Absences

Chronic Absence letter will be mailed home to parents when students have had absences, both excused and/or unexcused, that equal more than 10% of the school year. According to District policy, all absences past 14 in a year require a physician's note. These letters follow the legal codes regarding compulsory attendance. If appropriate, a referral will be made to the County School Attendance Review Board (SARB)

School Messenger

An automated phone caller will notify parents/guardians nightly of any period absence for that current school day. There is an option to reply to the automated call.

SLVHS ATHLETIC CODE OF CONDUCT

The purpose of the Athletic code is to set a high standard of conduct, eligibility, and behavior. Students who participate in athletics do so with the understanding that the established rules and consequences will be observed. Students will be expected to faithfully follow these regulations. For athletics, the season starts with the first allowable practice by C.I.F. and ends with the last contest including playoffs.

Students will meet eligibility requirements: pass all classes (at least 20 credits) with an overall 2.0 GPA or better and receive no F or WF grades. Eligibility will be declared at the beginning of each year and following each grading period. Ineligible athletes may practice with the team but may not wear the game uniform, play in a game, participate in a scrimmage against another opponent, or get an early out to travel with the team. Students who quit or are dropped from a team due to disciplinary reasons cannot participate in another sport until that team has completed its season.

If a student does not attend some part of the school, that student is ineligible to play in any contest or practice that day.

Students will not use or possess tobacco, alcohol, marijuana or other illegal drugs on or off campus. This rule applies to the school year, not per season. For example: first offense on a fall team results

in a week suspension from the team, second offense on a winter team results in being removed from that activity or sport, a third offense on any team and the student is removed from all sports teams for the remainder of the school year. Students who are removed for the year may continue to practice but are not allowed to play in a game.

First offense - suspended from contests for one week (student may practice).

Second offense – removed from the current team.

Third offense – may not participate in athletics for the remainder of the school year.

- Students will establish regular and prompt attendance at all practices and games except in case of illness or when the students are excused by the coach
- Students must represent the school, family and community through good citizenship and conduct at all times. This includes:
 - Displaying good sportsmanship and cordial conduct to other athletes at all times.
 - Respecting the property of others.
 - Respecting the integrity and judgment of athletic officials.
 - Avoiding profanity, vulgarity, sexual harassment, racism, and obscene actions of any nature.

First offense - conference with the coach and/or possible suspension.

Second offense - suspended from the team contests for one game up to one week.

Third offense - removed from the team.

DANCE POLICY

1. All dances are 7:00 to 9:30 p.m. (except the prom).
2. Tickets go on sale at 6:45 p.m.
3. Door closes at 8:00 p.m. (obtain special permission from administration for late arrivals ahead of time).
4. Only SLVHS students may buy tickets.
 - San Lorenzo Valley High School students may bring one guest only.
 - A dance guest permission slip must be obtained from the office and returned signed by the morning of the dance.
 - Guests will pay the non-ASB card ticket price.
 - Middle School Students and guests 21 years old or older are not permitted.
5. All school rules are in effect, including the dress code and proper behavior.

- Students may be subject to a search, and or breathalyzer test at the dance. Breathalyzer tests are conducted randomly and/or upon suspicion of intoxication. Staff administering breathalyzer tests have been trained and the devices are calibrated each year. Students who test positive for alcohol may also be subject to a search based on reasonable suspicion of possession of alcohol.
 - Any students suspended from school for breaking of the rules at the dance lose their dance privileges for the year. This includes the prom.
6. Appropriate dancing is expected. Students will be asked to leave and/or the dance may be stopped completely if dancing is too provocative.
 7. Students must leave the school premises immediately after leaving the dance.

DISCIPLINE

STUDENT RIGHTS

- Students have the right to feel safe at school
- Students have the right to the best possible instruction with freedom from classroom disruptions
- Students have the right to be treated with respect and dignity
- Free Speech does not mean you can say whatever you want whenever you want to.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- Students are to attend school every day and be on time to class
- Students are to put forward their best effort in school
- Students are to respect the opinions of others
- Students are to treat others with respect and dignity

CLASSROOM BEHAVIOR

If students engage in disruptive classroom behavior, the teacher will assign consequences. If the behavior continues, the student will be referred to the office. Appropriate behavior is expected whether the teacher, a substitute, or another staff member is in the room.

CITIZENSHIP

Be nice. Keep your hands to yourself. Respect others and their property. Show good sportsmanship. Don't have a potty mouth. Don't post anything online you wouldn't want your grandma to see. Don't text anything you don't want read aloud during the morning bulletin.

PROGRESSIVE DISCIPLINE

This tiered approach is used for repeat or continued offenses. Certain offenses do not follow this sequence and could result in immediate severe consequences, depending on the nature and the history of the student. Please refer to the Education Code Section 48900 and 48915. Failure to follow through with assigned consequences will result in loss of privileges.

Level 1: Teacher may employ preventative measures such as: re-assigning seats, redirecting the student's focus, proximity, verbal reminders. Teacher may discuss infraction with student privately. Teacher will contact parent/guardian through email or phone to discuss situation. Possible consequences could include removal from class for a period of time, lunch or after-school detention, or campus beautification.

Level 2: Teacher will refer student to office for counseling and/or disciplinary action. Parents will be contacted. Student will be removed from class for a minimum of one period. Consequences could include detention or on-campus suspension.

Level 3: For most second and/or repeat offenses a student could receive any of the above consequences, as well as home suspension. A parent meeting may be called, referral for counseling may be made, and a behavior contract may be created, which could involve a withdraw/failure of the class.

Level 4: For continued offenses, or for offense that break the law, a student could be suspended the maximum of five days, law enforcement may be contacted, and a move for expulsion could be made.

Please note: The indicated consequences are general guidelines used by school personnel. Specific incidents and the severity of those incidents could warrant a more substantial consequence even on a first offense. All decisions on behavioral consequences are left to the discretion of the administrators of SLVHS.

ALTERCATION

Students may not engage in an altercation (pushing, wrestling) or an argument which disrupts the learning environment in class or on campus. *I was just messing around* or **He started it** is not a valid excuse for putting your hands on another person.

CELL PHONES

Use of cell phones in the classroom follows the same rules as other electronic devices. Unless the teacher asks you to take it out to use for a classroom activity, it should be in your pocket, backpack, silenced and left alone. Improper use during class will bring a consequence which could include confiscation. School WiFi is not available for student phones during school hours.

CHEATING

Cheating is a major breach of trust between the student and teacher. Students who cheat will receive a zero on the assignment, as well as appropriate school-based consequences. Consequences from detention to suspension will be given based on the circumstances and frequency with which cheating has occurred. Multiple offenses of cheating will result in a grade of F for the entire course.

Cheating includes: copying homework from others, plagiarism, letting others copy homework, taking answers from others, giving answers to others, tampering with electronic information.

CLASSROOM DISTURBANCE/DEFIANCE

Students may not disturb or disrupt the classroom learning environment. Students shall not disrupt school activities or otherwise defy the valid authority or direction of supervisors, teachers, substitutes, administrators or anyone who works for the school. This includes, but is not limited to: arguing, off task behavior such as side conversations, not following the directions of staff, blurting out... Students shall not act in an unruly or disruptive manner or in a way that may endanger other students.

DANGEROUS OBJECTS

Students may not possess any firearm, explosive, fire crackers, smoke bombs, pepper spray, daggers, knives, switchblade knives, knives with a blade that locks, razors, Leatherman tools, pocket knives, handcuffs, any type of gun real or fake, matches, lighters, or other dangerous objects. This is EVERY DAY – including Halloween.

DRESS CODE

- Students are to be well-groomed and dressed in a manner that does not distract from or disrupt learning.
- State law requires that shoes be worn at all times.
- We require that shirts, pants and/or skirts/dresses be worn at all times. Excessive exposure of the body (breasts, buttocks, midriffs or visible underpants, undershirts (A-shirts) or bras is not acceptable. No sagging. No half shirts, strapless or low cut tops, short shorts/skirts/dresses.
- Any apparel, including emblems, buttons, belts or other ornamentation which is profane, vulgar, represents hate or prejudice (such as swastika, confederate flag), sex, drugs or alcohol or is gang-related, is not acceptable.

The dress code will be in effect at all school related activities. Students must follow this policy when dressing up for Halloween and Spirit Week as well as dances.

DRIVING, PARKING REGULATIONS AND PERMIT RULES

Students shall abide by the following regulations if they choose to drive any vehicle onto campus.

- Students must purchase a permit to park on campus. Permits are \$20.00 for the year.
- Permits must be displayed on the rear view mirror while parked on campus
- Students may ONLY park in *student spots* during school hours. Students will not park in handicapped, visitor or staff parking
- Students will drive safely and slowly while in parking lots.
- Students shall not park along any curb painted red or yellow

The parking lot is not a place for loitering. The parking lot will be closed during brunch, class time and passing periods. Students should bring all their school materials with them when they leave

their vehicle each morning. During lunch students may choose to go off campus in their vehicles within the first 10 minutes. If students choose to stay on campus, but don't have an afternoon class they may leave the last 10 minutes.

Students will lose their parking permit, and possibly receive other school consequences and/or a citation for not following one of the rules or regulations listed above.

DRIVING RECKLESSLY

Students may not drive in a manner deemed unsafe by school personnel. This includes, but is not limited to: excessive speed, peeling out, backing up unsafely, allowing students to ride outside the vehicle when in motion. Parking lot speeds should not exceed 10 miles per hour.

DRUGS (PARAPHERNALIA)

Students may not possess any drug paraphernalia. This includes, but is not limited to: vaporizer pens, e-cigarettes, pipes, bong, needles, papers, rollers, grinders, scissors, lighters, matches.

DRUGS (POSSESSION, USE, UNDER INFLUENCE)

Students may not possess, use, or be under the influence of any controlled substance, alcoholic beverage or intoxicant. Even if a student is in possession of a medical marijuana card, the student may not bring paraphernalia, marijuana or be under the influence of marijuana while on school grounds. Students in possession of drugs will be suspended five days and cited by the Sheriff's Office on the first offense. Subsequent offenses may warrant a move for expulsion.

DRUG (SALES)

Students who arrange or negotiate to sell, buy or otherwise provide any controlled substance, alcoholic beverage or an intoxicant of any kind will be suspended for five days, cited by the Sheriff's Office, and a move for expulsion will be made. This includes over-the-counter drugs.

DRUGS (TOBACCO)

Students may not possess or use tobacco (smoking, chewing, snuff, e cigarettes or vaporizer pens) on the high school, middle school or elementary school campuses, or at the bus stop, deli, or areas which surround the immediate campus.

ELECTRONIC DEVICE POLICY

The use of electronic devices will be a significant part of your educational day. However, they won't be used all the time. It is at the discretion of the teacher as to when and where electronic devices will be used. Devices are to be turned off, silenced or in sleep mode during class time unless the teachers want them used as part of the learning. Recreational device use is prohibited during class. See BYOD Expectations.

FIGHTING

Students shall not cause, intend to cause or threaten to cause injury to another person. Depending on the severity, even on the first offense the student will be suspended and could be referred to a law enforcement agency or expelled. Self defense is using physical force to remove oneself from a dangerous situation. *He hit me first* does not on its own constitute self-defense.

GAMBLING or SELLING

Students may not gamble or sell items for money or property at school. Depending on the severity, the student may be referred to a law enforcement agency.

GRAFFITI/VANDALISM

Students may not damage personal or school property or student's property. Depending on severity the student could be suspended for five days on the first offense, referred to a law agency and recommended for expulsion. This includes vandalism/tampering with school computer systems or materials or the unauthorized use of school computers or system. The student and/or the student's parents may be financially responsible for damaged items.

HARASSMENT/BULLYING (SEXUAL/HATE/HAZING/CYBER)

Students may not coerce others through threats or intimidation. Students shall not haze, sexually harass or commit any act which degrades or discredits students and/or staff. Harassment has nothing to do with intent, and it is determined by the victim. Harassment is defined as intentional threats or intimidation directed against a person or group that is so severe that it disrupts class work, creates substantial disorder and invades the rights of the student by creating an intimidating or hostile environment.

- **Sexual harassment** means unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors and/or other verbal, visual or physical conduct of a sexual nature. Any student who feels he/she is the victim of harassment must notify a teacher, counselor or administrator. The student may be asked to provide a written statement. Any form of sexual harassment toward personnel or students will result in automatic suspension and/or expulsion.
- **Hate Violence** is the use or threat of force to willfully injure, intimidate, interfere with, oppress, or threaten the rights of another person; or to knowingly deface, damage or destroy the property of another person to intimidate or interfere with the rights of that person because of their race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, disability, gender or sexual orientation. Emblems/clothing displaying hate or "isms" defined but not limited to confederate flag and/or swastika. Hazing includes degrading freshmen or other groups at any rally, assembly or gathering. Depending on the severity, the students may be referred to a law enforcement agency and expelled.
- **Cyber-bullying** is bullying through an electronic act. An *electronic act* means the transmission of a communication, including, but not limited to, a message, text, sound, or image by means of an electronic device.

LEWD BEHAVIOR

Students may not engage in obscene or indecent acts or possess pornography. A student may be recommended for expulsion on the first offense. Depending on the severity, student may also be referred to law enforcement.

LITTERING

Don't be a dirty litterbug. Pack your trash and respect your fellow students and your school.

LOITERING

Students may not loiter on campus. Students not in class will be asked to leave, sit quietly on the lawn or go to the library. Failure to comply with this rule is an act of defiance. Students who do not attend classes at SLVHS are not allowed on campus from 7:45 AM to 2:49 PM (school hours) unless approved by administration.

OFF CAMPUS

Students may leave in vehicles during lunch. Students are not allowed to walk off campus at any time unless prior arrangements are made with a parent and Administration. Students are not allowed to eat or hang out in the parking lot or fields during brunch and lunch. All school rules remain in force during brunch and lunch, before and after school. Students may walk to Castelli's Deli at lunch. They may not cross Highway 9 or go past the deli and must return to campus if asked by a school employee to do so.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Prohibited items include but are not limited to: laser pens, pets, toy guns, zappers, high pitched noise devices, and water balloons, or any item that is not necessary for instructional purposes and/or may cause a disruption to the learning process or endanger others.

RUMORS/GOSSIP

Students are not to spread rumors or gossip, as this is hurtful to students and may lead to verbal or physical confrontation. This activity is considered an act of defiance and disruptive to school activities. Students may be referred to conflict resolution program. If the rumors or gossip continue it is considered a form of harassment. This includes the use of the internet and social media that creates a disruption to the learning process or endangers others.

RUNNING / WALKING FROM CAMPUS SUPERVIROR/FACULTY MEMBER/SRO

Any student choosing to walk or run away from any faculty member who asked them to stay or come with them to the office will automatically be given the maximum suspension allowed. It is a major act of defiance.

SKATEBOARDS, BICYCLES, AND SCOOTERS

Students may bring skateboards, bikes or scooters to school; however, at no time may the items be used on campus. Bicycles and scooters must be locked to the bicycle storage rack.

STUDENT DISPLAY OF AFFECTION (PDA-Public Display of Affection)

Students are not allowed to openly display their affections for another person to such an extent that their actions are offensive to others.

THEFT

Students may not steal another person's or the school's property. Depending on the severity, the student may be suspended on the first offense, referred to a law enforcement agency and recommended for expulsion.
